The Management Committee present their report (incorporating the Strategic Report) and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2025.

Legal Status

The Co-op is registered with the Financial Conduct Authority as a Co-operative and Community Benefits Society, The Office of the Scottish Charities Regulator (OSCR) as a charity and the Scottish Housing Regulator as a Registered Social Landlord.

- Forgewood Housing Co-operative is a registered Scottish Charity (charity number SC045344)
- Registered under the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014 (No.2439R(S)) and with the Scottish Housing Regulator (No 271).
- Registered as a property factor under the Property Factors (Scotland) Act 2011 (No: PF000179)

Principal Activity

The principal activities of the Co-op are to provide:

- · Affordable and attractive housing for social rent in a well-maintained community
- · Management and maintenance services to tenants
- Community initiatives and support wider role activities

Corporate & Governance

During 2024/25 the Co-op had a stable management committee, with a total of 12 share members on the governing body (GB). We also had 106 shareholders and annually update the register of committee members. At our AGM in September 2024, we had 14 attendees, half of them committee members and the other half shareholders who also resided in Co-operative stock.

The Management Committee has complied with all its statutory and regulatory requirements throughout the year and approved its Annual Assurance Statement in October 2024. This Statement was submitted to the Scottish Housing Regulator and has been made available to all tenants and stakeholders. The Committee has an approved Assurance Improvement Plan, which details the areas of the Regulatory Framework that can be updated from compliance to achieving best practice

The Management Committee receives regular reports on the Improvement Plan, via various focus groups and other tenant/staff/committee activity and other reports.

In March 2025, the Scottish Housing Regulator published FHC's Engagement Plan for 2025/26, confirming that the Co-op's status is Compliant and the only engagement required with the Regulator will be through the standard regulatory returns and any notifiable events.

In early April 2025, Forgewood Housing Co-op was selected as one of ten RSLs/Local authorities throughout the country who would be visited by the Scottish Housing Regulator. This involved the preparation and sharing of evidence in many areas the SHR would focus on, mainly the Annual Assurance Statement process, tenant and resident safety and covenant compliance. This visit took place on 28 May 2025 and feedback from the SHR was very positive and constructive. Any areas for improvement identified were minor and action taken immediately and acknowledged by the SHR. The positive practice areas identified were published on their website and in the Scottish Housing News site post year end, on 4 August 2025.

Key highlights and feedback from the year

- On 1 April 2024, Paul Lennon was appointed as Director following a rigorous recruitment process. Having served the Co-op since 1999 in various capacities and as part of the senior team since 2005, Paul has played a pivotal role in driving high performance and ensuring compliance with regulatory standards.
- The Co-op secured a £1.25 million loan from Nationwide, initially to refinance an existing facility with over £300,000 outstanding. A portion of the initial drawdown has been earmarked for upgrading bathrooms in properties that have not yet benefited from recent improvements, as part of our ongoing investment programme.
- A comprehensive review of the Factoring service was undertaken. Although resource-intensive, this process will enable the Co-op to recover accurate charges for factoring-related services going forward.
- During 2024/25, we evaluated our IT service provision with the dual aim of achieving cost efficiencies and strengthening our infrastructure. A key focus is maintaining enhanced cyber security, and we are working towards achieving Cyber Essentials accreditation.
- A full Tenant Satisfaction Survey is scheduled for 2025. Insights from this survey will inform future Annual
 Assurance Statements and help shape our strategic direction as well as continually improve on our service
 delivery. We do continue to monitor satisfaction with our maintenance services throughout the year. Notably,
 tenant feedback on repairs carried out in their homes has shown year-on-year improvement.
- Our commitment to training and development remains strong. Both staff and Management Committee
 members participated in ongoing training and appraisal activities. While external training is supported where
 appropriate, we also deliver tailored in-house sessions led by experienced staff.
- Tenant engagement remains central to our work. In 2024, during the presentation of the 2023/24 annual accounts, we took the opportunity to discuss and present the Annual Assurance Statement process with tenant shareholders, helping to build understanding of its role in our strategic planning.
- Unfortunately, insurance costs as well as general increases in contractors/materials costs are still at a higher than budgeted level.
- The economy has not performed as well as expected either and this has resulted in higher interest rates for longer periods as well as inflation higher than expected in our budgeting.
- In January 2025, the country suffered damage due to Storm Éowyn. This unexpected weather event cost the Co-op additional spend as insurance would not cover any of the damage to mainly fencing in the area. Swift work was carried out however costs were met from our day to day repairs reactive budget.
- During the year, the Co-op had 2 very successful internal audits carried out. One on "tenant and resident safety" and the other in finance on "payments and payroll".

Management Committee Induction and Development

The Management Committee is composed of individuals who are well-acquainted with the Co-op's day-to-day operations. When new members join, they are provided with essential information outlining their responsibilities, key governance documents, and the latest financial reports. To support their integration, a structured induction and training programme is offered. In 2024/25, this was delivered by an external facilitator, although future sessions may be conducted in-house to reduce costs.

Annual appraisals for committee members are recognised as good practice and will be facilitated by our experienced senior staff, with external consultants when necessary. These appraisals are designed to support members in contributing effectively to the strategic discussions and decision-making at committee meetings.

The Management Committee and Senior Officer

Details of the Management Committee and senior officers are provided on the first page of the financial statements.

Each Management Committee member holds one fully paid £1 share in the Co-op. The Senior officer, (director) while not a shareholder operates within the authority delegated to him by the Committee and carries out his duties accordingly. This is also the case for members of the senior management team.

As noted earlier, the Co-op had 106 shareholding members during the year which is a strong level of engagement relative to our housing stock of 215 properties. The shareholder register is reviewed and updated annually. In line with our rules, any member who has missed five consecutive AGMs without submitting apologies is removed from the register.

Related Party Transactions

Bridges Housing Association, a non-registered social landlord, has been non-operational since 2018.

Historically, it served as a service vehicle involving the Co-op's two former directors, who provided director-level services and, in some cases, development support to other RSLs. As of 2024, there is no ongoing relationship or interest between Bridges and Forgewood Housing Co-op.

Forgewood continues to maintain a joint staffing arrangement with Garrion People's Housing Co-op in Wishaw. This partnership is subject to regular review in collaboration with Garrion, with a view to assessing the future direction of both organisations.

A strategic appraisal of this arrangement will be undertaken during 2025/26 as part of the Co-op's next committee and staff strategic planning session.

Currently, half of the Management Committee members (7 out of 12) are tenants of the Co-op. All tenant members hold standard Scottish Secure Tenancy agreements and are not permitted to use their position for personal gain. The Co-op has a robust Conflicts of Interest Policy in place, which all Committee members adhere to. Any related transactions involving Committee members are disclosed accordingly.

Strategic Objectives

The Co-op has adopted the following strategic objectives:

- Ensure that our rents remain affordable, maintain a stock base sufficient to achieve economies of scale and deliver effective services in a cost-efficient way.
- Maintain the high quality of our housing and service provision, ensuring the comfort of tenants and the
 protection of investment.
- Contribute to the wellbeing of the local community by working with tenants, residents, partners and funders to develop initiatives that increase levels of inclusion.
- Ensure that the work of the Forgewood Housing Co-operative is supported by good governance, effective financial, management and regulatory compliance and robust administrative and HR systems.
- Ensure we attract and retain highly skilled and knowledgeable staff and Management Committee members.
 Develop our staff and Management Committee members through education, training and coaching.

To achieve these objectives, we will collaborate with our strategic partners at national, local authority, and community levels. Our decision-making and business direction will consistently reflect our commitment to delivering added value, supporting the advancement of social housing principles and community development.

Future Prospects

The key objectives for 2025/26 will be reviewed and agreed by the Management Committee during the year. These will include the following priorities:

- Finalisation of a new Strategic Plan, which will clearly outline the Co-op's aims, objectives, and aspirations
 for the medium term. A central element of this plan will be the development of initiatives to support our
 commitment to achieving the Scottish Housing Net Zero Standard (SHNZS) targets.
- Continued focus on high performing results in our approach to tenant and resident safety.
- Ongoing review of our joint working arrangements with Garrion People's Housing Co-op in Wishaw.
- Continued investment in our housing stock, focusing on major repairs and renewals.
- Ensuring covenant compliance is achieved at all times with robust and suitable policies and procedures.
- Strengthening our annual assurance statement process and continue to work with tenant groups in doing so.
- Strengthening our commitment to community engagement by supporting initiatives that promote social
 inclusion and cohesion. We will actively pursue all available funding opportunities to sustain and strengthen
 our community development work and staffing resources.

- Maintaining the delivery of high-quality, responsive housing management and maintenance services that meet tenant expectations and fully comply with the Scottish Social Housing Charter.
- · Ensuring full compliance with all regulatory and statutory obligations.

Housing Maintenance Performance and Investment

The Co-op continues to deliver a high standard of reactive maintenance, with performance levels consistent with previous years. During the most recent reporting period, we achieved the following response times:

- Average time to complete emergency repairs: 2.10 hours
- Average time to complete non-emergency repairs: 3.75 days

Annual cyclical maintenance continues to be delivered across key areas, including gas servicing, electrical safety checks, water hygiene monitoring, roof anchor testing, fire detection inspections, and fire risk assessments. Additional services such as landscape maintenance, external painting, and gutter cleaning are also carried out routinely. Compliance-related expenditure for the year is £108,881 and £11,286 close cleaning costs.

Looking ahead to 2025/26, the Co-op plans to invest approximately £226,000 in a major component renewal programme. This will include the installation of around 40 new bathrooms in Forgewood flats as well as a programme of new boilers. Once completed, this will mean that all 140 flats will have received new bathrooms within the past five years, and we will have all boilers under 15 years old throughout our stock. The work is scheduled for late summer 2025 (bathrooms) and will follow a competitive tendering process already completed and in line with our updated procurement policy.

Our long-term asset management strategy is underpinned by independently conducted three-yearly Stock Condition Surveys (SCS) and regular updates to our life cycle costing model. The most recent SCS, completed in 2022, confirmed that all properties met the Scottish Housing Quality Standard (SHQS) — the Scottish Government's benchmark for housing quality.

To support future investment planning, a new SCS has been commissioned for August 2025, covering approximately 40% of our stock. This will provide updated component costings and reflect the impact of the UK's elevated inflation rate. Once complete, this will mean that 100% of our stock should have been surveyed since 2019.

As of March 2025, Scottish Housing Quality Standard compliance stood at 100%. This figure will be reviewed following the results of the 2025 Stock Condition Survey, which may lead to slight adjustments. The updated data will provide a robust, independently verified foundation for our 5-year and 30-year life cycle investment plans, ensuring our homes remain safe, high-quality, and fit for the future.

Housing Services

The Housing Management Team has several key priorities for 2025/26, including;

- Continue to support our tenants who are negatively impacted by the challenging financial environment.
- Review of the void management procedure to help streamline processes. While we have an excellent track record in how we manage our voids, it is essential that we sustain or improve on these figures.
- Improve our tenant engagement activities to ensure our customers remain at the heart of our service delivery.
- Forgewood Housing Co-operative utilises the Annual Assurance Statement process to continually identify
 areas for development and improvement, promoting an ongoing learning culture within the organisation.
 Building on the organisations existing focus on tenant engagement, whereby we have sought views from
 tenants on the Statement, Forgewood plans to establish a tenant working group, specifically to provide input
 on their annual assurance process. (From the SHR report published August 2025 on the annual assurance
 visits in May 2025)
- Sustain/Improve on our key performance indicators during 2025/26.
- Work with other partners, including neighbouring RSLs to help develop Forgewood into a thriving and attractive community and seek opportunities where collaborative working with these partners provides excellent outcomes for our communities.

Our successful partnership with Motherwell and Wishaw Citizens Advice Bureau is still working very well for the Co-op and its tenants. Client financial gains worth a significant £238,636 were claimed and recovered on behalf of Forgewood Housing Co-op tenants. It has also assisted in our rent arrears being at their lowest level since the Co-op's inception in 1993, with information on that performance below.

During the year, the Housing Management Team;

- Supported our tenants and decreased rent arrears. Also ensured a high number of tenants are a month in advance with their rent.
- Assisted tenants with the migration from legacy benefits to universal credit, working with the AFTAR project where necessary.

Housing Services (continued)

- Reviewed and implemented several policy and procedure reviews
- Completed the review of factoring arrangements including a new policy and updated statement of services.
- Continued to work on focus groups such as rent review, estate management, tenant satisfaction and our aim is to set up an ongoing annual assurance statement group.
- · Carried out tenant census forms while changing 4 weekly rent charges to calendar monthly.
- Worked with the rent focus group that resulted in a 3.3% increase on all tenancies.
- Will help form the tenant satisfaction survey review and build into the survey, key elements of the annual assurance statement and regulatory framework.

The Co-op carried out its own annual tenant satisfaction survey (TSS) updates on the indicator "repairs and maintenance service over last 12 months" and has improved in the last 2 years. Our 2025 TSS will help us improve our services in various areas of service delivery and we will be factoring in the annual assurance statement to the SHR in this year's survey. We will also have a working group of tenants/staff along with the company carrying out the TSS to take this forward.

Financial (rents) Performance

Total rents receivable for 2024/25 is £997,773 as opposed to £934,583 for 2023/24.

The rent increase applied in 2024/25 was 5% which is identical to the previous year. The rent applied for 2025/26 is 3.3%.

Rent arrears, void control, allocations and repairs are all areas of service delivery which have all been managed very well for yet another year at Forgewood Housing Co-op.

Committee of Management and Executive Office

The members of the Management Committee and the Executive Officers are listed on page 1.

Going Concern

The Management Committee has reviewed the results for this year and has also reviewed the projections for the next five years. The Management Committee has considered the risks associated with its activities and has updated its plans and financial projections to ensure that it is able to manage those risks to minimise any financial implications and uncertainties. It therefore has a reasonable expectation that the co-operative has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, the going concern basis has been adopted in these financial statements. Further details are given in the going concern accounting policy in note 1.

Statement of Management Committee's responsibilities

The Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014 require the Management Committee to prepare Financial Statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the co-operative and of the surplus or deficit of the co-operative for that year. In preparing those Financial Statements, the Management Committee is required to:-

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently.
- Make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the Financial Statements.
- Prepare the Financial Statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the co-operative will continue in business;
- Prepare a statement on internal Financial Control.

The Management Committee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the co-operative and to enable them to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014, the Housing (Scotland) Act 2010 and the Determination of Accounting Requirements - 2019. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the co-operative and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. It is also responsible for ensuring the co-operative's suppliers are paid promptly.

The Management Committee must determine how amounts are presented within items in the income and expenditure account and balance sheet, have regard to the substance of the reported transaction or arrangement, in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices.

In so far as the Management Committee are aware:

- There is no relevant audit information (information needed by the Housing Co-operative's auditor in connection with preparing their report) of which the co-operative's auditor is unaware, and
- The Management Committee have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the Housing Co-operative's auditor is aware of that information.

Statement on Internal Financial Control

The Management Committee acknowledges its ultimate responsibility for ensuring that the co-operative has in place a system of controls that is appropriate for the business environment in which it operates. These controls are designed to give reasonable assurance with respect to:

- The reliability of financial information used within the co-operative, or for publication.
- · The maintenance of proper accounting records; and
- The safeguarding of assets against unauthorised use or disposition.

It is the Management Committee's responsibility to establish and maintain systems of Internal Financial Control. Such systems can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance against material financial misstatement or loss. Key elements of the co-operative's systems include ensuring that:

- Formal policies and procedures are in place, including the ongoing documentation of key systems and
 rules relating to the delegation of authority, which allow the monitoring of controls and restrict the
 unauthorised use of co-operative's assets;
- Experienced and suitably qualified staff take responsibility for important business functions and annual
 appraisal procedures have been established to maintain standards of performance.
- Forecasts and budgets are prepared which allow the management team and the management committee
 to monitor key business risks, financial objectives and the progress being made towards achieving the
 financial plans set for the year and for the medium term.
- Quarterly financial management reports are prepared promptly, providing relevant, reliable, and up to date financial and other information, with significant variances from budget being investigated as appropriate.
- Regulatory returns are prepared, authorized, and submitted promptly to the relevant regulatory bodies.
- All significant new initiatives, major commitments and investment projects are subject to formal authorization procedures, through the Management Committee.
- The Management Committee receive reports from management and from the external and internal
 auditors to provide reasonable assurance that control procedures are in place and are being followed and
 that a general review of the major risks facing the co-operative is undertaken; and
- Formal procedures have been established for instituting appropriate action to correct any weaknesses identified through internal or external audit reports.

The Management Committee has reviewed the effectiveness of the system of internal financial control in existence in the co-operative for the year ended 31 March 2025. No weaknesses were found in the internal financial controls which resulted in material losses, contingencies or uncertainties which require disclosure in the financial statements or in the auditor's report on the financial statements.

Auditors

Opinion

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs UK) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the housing co-operative in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of financial statements in the UK, including the FRC's Ethical Standard and we have fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the management committee members' use of the going concern basis of accounting in preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the co-operative's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the management committee members with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections in this report.

Other information

The other information comprises the information contained in the Management Committee's report, other than the financial statements and our auditor's report thereon. The Management Committee are responsible for the other information.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or our knowledge obtained in the audit or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If we identify such material inconsistencies or apparent material misstatements, we are required to determine whether there is a material misstatement of the other information. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact.

We have nothing to report in this regard.

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters where the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014 requires us to report to you, if in our opinion:

- · a satisfactory system of control over transactions has not been maintained; or,
- · the co-operative has not kept proper accounting records; or,
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the books of account of the co-operative; or
- · we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit.

Responsibilities of committee members

As explained more fully in the management committee's responsibilities statement set out on pages 9, the committee members are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the Management Committee determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the Management Committee are responsible for assessing the housing cooperative's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the committee members either intend to liquidate the housing co-operative or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

We have been appointed as auditor under the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014 and report in accordance with the Acts and relevant regulations made or having effect thereunder.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs (UK), we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or
 error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is
 sufficient and appropriate to provide the basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material
 misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve
 collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that
 are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness
 of the housing co-operative's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the committee members.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the Management Committee's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the co-operative's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the housing co-operative to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure, and content of the financial statements, including the
 disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a
 manner than achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below.

The extent to which the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities Including fraud

Our approach to identifying and assessing the risks of material misstatement in respect of irregularities, including fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations, was as follows:

- the responsible individual ensured that the engagement team collectively had the appropriate competence, capabilities, and skills to identify or recognise non-compliance with applicable laws and regulations;
- we identified the laws and regulations applicable to the co-operative through discussions with management and Management Committee members and from our sector knowledge;

- we focused on specific laws and regulations, including those specified by the Scottish Housing Regulator, which we considered may have a direct material effect on the financial statements or the operations of the co-operative, including the Co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014, Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice for Social Housing Providers 2018 and Determination of Housing Requirements 2019, and data protection, anti-bribery, employment, and health and safety legislation;
- we assessed the extent of compliance with the laws and regulations identified above through making enquiries of management and committee members; and
- identified laws and regulations were communicated within the audit team regularly and the team remained alert to instances of non-compliance throughout the audit.

We assessed the susceptibility of the co-operative's financial statements to material misstatement, including obtaining an understanding of how fraud might occur, by:

- making enquiries of management and Management Committee members as to where they considered there was susceptibility to fraud, their knowledge of actual, suspected, and alleged fraud; and
- considering the internal controls in place to mitigate risks of fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations.

To address the risk of fraud through management bias and override of controls, we:

- performed high level analytical procedures to identify any unusual or unexpected relationships;
- tested journal entries to identify unusual transactions;
- assessed whether judgements and assumptions made in determining the accounting estimates were indicative of potential bias; and
- investigated the rationale behind significant or unusual transactions.

In response to the risk of irregularities and non-compliance with laws and regulations, we designed procedures which included, but were not limited to:

- agreeing financial statement disclosures to underlying supporting documentation;
- reading the minutes of meetings of those charged with governance;
- enquiring of management and Management Committee members as to actual and potential litigation and claims; and
- reviewing correspondence with Scottish Housing Regulator.

There are inherent limitations in our audit procedures described above. The more removed that laws and regulations are from financial transactions, the less likely it is that we would become aware of non-compliance.

Auditing standards also limit the audit procedures required to identify non-compliance with laws and regulations to enquiry of the Management Committee and other management and the inspection of regulatory and legal correspondence, if any.

Material misstatements that arise due to fraud can be harder to detect than those that arise from error as they may involve deliberate concealment or collusion.

Use of our report

This report is made solely to the co-operative's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 87 of the co-operative and Community Benefit Societies Act 2014. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the co-operative's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the co-operative and the co-operative's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

1. Principal accounting policies

Legal status

The co-operative is incorporated under the Co-operative and Community Benefits Societies Act 2014 and is registered by the Financial Conduct Authority. The co-operative is a Public Benefit Entity in terms of its compliance with Financial Reporting Standard 102.

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 - 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Statement of Recommended Practice for Social Housing Providers 2018 and comply with the requirements of the Determination of Housing Requirements 2019 as issued by the Scottish Housing Regulator.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the co-operative's accounting policies (see below).

The following principal accounting policies have been applied:

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis after consideration of the future prospects of the co-operative, its long-term financial forecasts for the next five years, and the certainty of cash flow from rental of social housing stock. The co-operative has taken into account any ongoing impact of the current economic uncertainties in its consideration and is satisfied that the co-operative has adequate resources to manage the impact of these issues on an ongoing basis.

Revenue

The co-operative recognises rent receivable net of losses from voids. Service Charge Income (net of voids) is recognised as expenditure is incurred as this is considered to be the point when the service has been performed and the revenue recognition criteria is met.

Government Grants are released to income over the expected useful life of the asset to which it relates.

Retirement Benefits

The co-operative participates in the Scottish Housing Association Defined Benefits Pension Scheme and retirement benefits to employees of the co-operative are funded by the contributions from all participating employers and employees in the Scheme. Payments are made in accordance with periodic calculations by consulting Actuaries and are based on pension costs applicable across the various participating co-operatives taken as a whole.

The co-operative accounts for the pension scheme on a defined benefit basis based on its share of scheme assets and liabilities as determined by the actuary. Defined benefit costs are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income within operating costs. Actuarial gains and losses are recognised in Other Comprehensive Income. Further details are disclosed in the notes to the accounts.

1. Principal accounting policies (continued)

Housing properties

Housing Properties are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Housing under construction and Land are not depreciated. The co-operative depreciates housing properties by major component on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful economic lives of each identified component. All components are categorised as Housing Properties within note 10(a). Impairment reviews are carried out if events or circumstances indicate that the carrying value of the components listed below is higher than the recoverable amount.

Depreciation and Impairment of Other Non-Current Assets

Other non-current assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged on a straight-line basis over the expected economic useful lives of the assets at the following annual rates:-

Community Centre 2% Straight Line
Office Equipment 25% Straight Line

The carrying value of other non-current assets is reviewed for impairment at the end of each reporting year.

Social Housing Grant and Other Grants in Advance/Arrears

Social Housing Grants and Other Capital Grants are accounted for using the Accrual Method as outlined in Section 24 of Financial Reporting Standard 102. Grants are treated as deferred income and recognised in income on a systematic basis over the expected useful life of the property and assets to which it relates.

Social Housing Grant attributed to individual components is written off to the Income and Expenditure Account when these components are replaced.

Social Housing Grant received in respect of revenue expenditure is credited to the Income and Expenditure Account in the same year as the expenditure to which it relates.

Although Social Housing Grant is treated as a grant for accounting purposes, it may nevertheless become repayable in certain circumstances, such as the disposal of certain assets. The amount repayable would be restricted to the net proceeds of sale.

1. Principal accounting policies (continued)

Sales of housing properties

First tranche Shared Ownership disposals are credited to turnover on completion. The cost of construction of these sales is taken to operating cost. In accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, disposals of subsequent tranches are treated as non-current asset disposals with the gain or loss on disposal shown in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Disposals under shared equity schemes are accounted for in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. The remaining equity in the property is treated as a non-current asset investment, which is matched with the grant received.

Estimation uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain accounting estimates. It also requires the Management Committee to exercise judgement in applying the co-operative's Accounting Policies. The areas requiring a higher degree of judgement, or complexity, and areas where assumptions or estimates are most significant to the financial statements, is disclosed below:

Life cycle of components

The co-operative estimates the useful lives of major components of its housing property with reference to surveys carried out by external qualified surveyors.

Useful lives of other fixed assets

The useful lives of other fixed Assets are based on the knowledge of senior management at the co-operative with reference to expected asset life cycles.

Pension liabilities

This has relied on the actuarial assumptions of qualified actuaries which have been reviewed and are considered reasonable and appropriate. Assumptions in respect of discount rates and inflation will vary from year to year, as will the value of assets and will be dependent on circumstances at the date of valuation.

Housing grants

The co-operative estimates amortisation of grants based on the useful lives of major components of its housing property with reference to surveys carried out by external qualified surveyors.

Leases

Costs in respect of operating leases are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Works to Existing Properties

The co-operative capitalises major repairs expenditure where these works result in an enhancement of economic benefits by increasing the net rental stream over the life of the property.

1. Principal accounting policies (continued)

Key judgements made in the application of accounting policies

a) The categorisation of housing properties

In the judgement of the Management Committee the entirety of the co-operative's housing stock is held for social benefit and is therefore classified as Property, Plant and Equipment in accordance with FRS 102.

b) Identification of cash generating units

The co-operative considers its cash-generating units to be the scheme in which it manages its housing property for asset management purposes.

c) Pension liability

In May 2024 the co-operative received details from the Pension Trust of its share of assets, liabilities, and scheme deficit. The co-operative has used this information as the basis of the pension defined benefit liability as disclosed in these accounts. The Management Committee consider this the best estimate of their scheme liability.

Financial instruments - basic

The co-operative only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like rents, accounts receivable and payable, loans from banks and related parties.

These are recognised in accordance with Section 11 of Financial Reporting Standard 102.

The co-operative's debt instruments are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

21. Details of co-operative

The co-operative is a Registered Society registered within the Financial Conduct Authority and is domiciled in Scotland.

The co-operative's principal place of business is 49 Dinmont Crescent, Forgewood, Motherwell, ML1 3TT.

The co-operative is a Registered Social Landlord and Scottish Charity that owns and manages social housing in Motherwell.

22. Retirement benefit obligations

The Co-operative participates in the Scottish Housing Associations' Pension Scheme (the Scheme), a multi-employer scheme which provides benefits to some 150 non-associated employers. The Scheme is a defined benefit scheme in the UK.

The Scheme is subject to the funding legislation outlined in the Pensions Act 2004 which came into force on 30 December 2005. This, together with documents issued by the Pensions Regulator and Technical Actuarial Standards issued by the Financial Reporting Council, sets out the framework for funding defined benefit occupational pension schemes in the UK.

The last triennial valuation of the scheme for funding purposes was carried out as at 30 September 2024. This valuation revealed a deficit of £79.5m. A Recovery Plan is therefore required to address the deficit. Under the terms of the Plan, deficit recovery contributions will recommence from 1 April 2026 at £20.8k per annum, with Scheme expenses payable at £1.9k per annum. Deficit contributions are due to end on 31 March 2030. Both the deficit contributions and Scheme expenses will increase by 3% annually on 1 April, with the first increase effective from 1 April 2027.

At the time the 2024 actuarial valuation was agreed, the outcome of a court case relating to the Scheme Benefit Review remained unknown. To enable the valuation to be concluded, the Scheme's committees agreed that the deficit recovery period may be extended by up to two years, to a maximum end date of 31 March 2032, in the event that the court judgment results in additional Scheme liabilities. This provision is intended to allow participating employers to budget for a potential extension to the Recovery Plan, should this be required.

The position will be reviewed as part of the 2027 actuarial valuation, at which time the impact of the court judgment on Scheme liabilities will be more certain.

22. Retirement benefit obligations (continued)

The Scheme is classified as a 'last-man standing arrangement'. Therefore, the Co-operative is potentially liable for other participating employers' obligations if those employers are unable to meet their share of the scheme deficit following withdrawal from the Scheme. Participating employers are legally required to meet their share of the Scheme deficit on an annuity purchase basis on withdrawal from the Scheme.

The Scheme is accounted for as a defined benefit scheme because sufficient information is available.

For accounting purposes, a valuation of the Scheme was carried out with an effective date of 30 September 2024. The liability figures from this valuation have been rolled forward to the accounting date of 31 March 2025.

The liabilities are compared, at the relevant accounting date, with the co-operative's fair share of the Scheme's total assets to calculate the Co-operative's net deficit or surplus.
